Julien Vermeulen, Feather Master



In 2020, maison parisienne is very proud to welcome talented French artist

Julien Vermeulen into our team of artists and craftsmen. maison parisienne presented him for the first time in January 2020, for "La Promenade du Collectionneur" exhibition at Hotel Solvay in Brussels, and then a second time on Collect Art Fair in London, in February-March 2020.

Julien Vermeulen is the winner of the 2018 Prix de la Fondation Bettencourt-Schueller pour l'Intelligence de la Main — Talents d'Exception ("Handcrafts — Exceptional Talents" Prize from the Bettencourt-Schueller Foundation). What drives him is his will to innovate, refresh and push the limits of material. In keeping with the age-old traditions of feather craft, he sets to explore his favorite medium, diversifying the applications of feathers as an artistic material.

Exploring and inventing technical processes that alter their feel, look, color, texture, shape (including crimping, scorching, mounting, braiding, weaving, sewing...), Julien Vermeulen transforms ostrich, peacock, goose, pheasant, turkey feathers in turn into a panel, a mural, a decorative pattern, an ornament or a sculpture.

Fascinated by the porosity that exists between arts and crafts, **Julien Vermeulen** is in a constant state of creative and technical research. His preoccupation with experimentation and innovation is what drives him to create unique artworks, that are truly in between handicraft workmanship and art objects.

One of his last creations is the wall panel "Black Gem," composed of goose and pheasant feathers.

Julien Vermeulen recently created small format panels, including a symmetrical triptych that creates a subtle interplay of light and shade, with the feathers arranged both face down for a glossy finish and face up for a matte fish.





Julien Vermeulen, Rewarded

In spite of or maybe thanks to his youth, Julien Vermeulen's work has already been rewarded many times. He is the recipient of many awards including:

For the Palais de Tokyo's Espace Toguna in Paris, Julien Vermeulen created the monumental artwork "Black Ocean," a 20-square meter wall covered with more than 12,000 turkey feathers, each one hand cut and hand painted with Indian ink. The duration of this spectacular artwork's creation was a shocking fifteen days - a thousand hours of hard work and a technical prowess that was rewarded with the "Handcrafts — Exceptional Talents" Prize from the Bettencourt-Schueller Foundation in 2018.

Julien Vermeulen, Prestigious Collaborations

Trained in Lycée Octave Feuillet, the very last French institution for feather craft, **Julien Vermeulen** graduated from college with two other degrees, one in Fashion Design and another in Plastic Arts and Art Sciences. Since 2015, he has been creating unique handmade pieces for both fashion collections and runway shows, collaborating with prestigious houses such as:

Lanvin, Schiapparelli, Yves Saint-Laurent, Dior, Dolce&Gabbana, Cartier and Givenchy.

His constant quest for new techniques and new processes is what enables **Julien Vermeulen** to create new textures and new applications to work on all sorts of projects integrating feather art. He has collaborated on numerous projects including with:

- Dior, to create Jewelry window displays at Harrods London and Galeries Lafayette Paris in 2014,
- Garde Républicaine Française (French Republican Guard), to restore and create feather helmets in 2015,


