Enjoy the view in new Pierre Renart seating at Hôtel de la Marine

With its remarkable facets and interplay of light and shade, architect Hugh Dutton's glass roof is a striking crown for the Cour de L'intendant public passageway tucked into the [Hôtel de la Marine](#) on the Place de la Concorde. And this year, there's no better place to gaze in wonder at it than comfortably sunk into innovative woodworker [Pierre Renart's](#) new seating. Escale refines Renart's notable Fusion collection of wood-slat furniture into a single, sculptural riff on a bird's nest. Seven strips of gray-tone hornbeam form the frame, which counters Dutton's architectural feat with its own heroic length of some 138 inches. *Cour de L'intendant, 2 place de la Concorde*
